Project Summary

The Great Heath is a diverse landscape of heathland, woods, wetlands and farmland, interwoven with the conurbation of Bournemouth, Christchurch, East Dorset and Poole. It once covered most of south-east Dorset, from Purbeck to the New Forest.

A partnership was formed by Dorset Wildlife Trust when a significant area of The Great Heath came up for sale by the Canford Estate, to secure these wildlife habitats and green spaces.

The Great Heath sites include heathland, wetland, woodland, meadow, marsh and harbour. The area stretches from Lytchett in the west through Upton, Corfe Mullen, Broadstone and Ferndown to Parley in the east.

Outcomes

- 3 new Nature Parks created - a Nature Park is a public expression of the intention of the partnership to work together to manage the area for its special features and value to people and wildlife.
- 589 hectares of hectares secured for wildlife and people.
- 23 sites with new interpretation and improved access.
- 386 event held attended by 18,54 people.
- 29 schools, business and community groups received wildlife gardening advice.
- 329 volunteering events - 19,104 volunteering hours.
- 1192 students contributed to the project.
- 26 people completed the completed the AQA course to become Wildlife Champions.
- 64 children with special educational needs or behavioural issues engaged.
- Over 4000 records received for 32 species as part of the Species of the Month campaign.
- 109 gardens awarded a Wildlife Gardening plaque.

How partnership working benefited the project

By working together with many different organisations, communities and individuals, the project has enhanced the profile of the area. It has stimulated more people to get out and learn about, conserve and enjoy their local environment.
